The first clause states: 'no street trading involving food shall be permitted within 300 metres of an educational establishment, school or dedicated permanent play facility.' A street trading consent application was received on 21 st June 2024 by the licensing department to operate a food van to sell food and drink as part of a project commissioned by Swindon Borough Council Youth Justice Service and the office of the Police and Crime Commissioner around supporting young people on the edge of criminal exploitation.
1.3	Who is affected by the policy/decision/service/ project/programme? (e.g. employees/service users/supplier/contractor)	Existing or prospective street traders who may have been refused applications due to their close proximity to schools or educational facilities.

The project is being funded through the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner. Public Health, who initially had investment in the Street Trading policy changes to increase the radius by which street traders can operate from educational establishments, schools and permanent play facilities to promote a healthier Swindon, have demonstrated support for this specific project. This proposal is for a one off exemption.
